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

ISSUES REGARDING THE PROPOSED 700-PM SUCTION DREDGE PERMIT

Reprinted from the Waldo News letter written by Tom Kitchar.

PROPOSED TIMELINE: If the new 700-PM General Permit is approved by the EQC (on June 23), then DEQ expects the new permit to be "effective" and available as early as July 1, 2005. If

this happens, DEQ plans to begin sending the permit applications to holders of the extended permit or to those with MAOs on July 1. DEQ expects to process as many as 1950 applications within the first 30 days. (NOTE: If the new permit goes into effect as of July 1, 2005, all of the Administratively Extended Permits (700-J) and all of the MAOs automatically become null and void on that same date (07/01/05)... and if DEQ waits to send out applications until after that date, then there obviously will be a period of time when no one will have a permit or MAO! This period is expected to be at least 1.5 weeks... and more like 2-3 weeks or more, depending on how fast DEQ mails the applications, how fast the miners get the applications, how fast the miners mail back the applications (with fees), how fast DEQ processes the applications, and how fast DEQ can get the permits out in the mail.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS ON THE NEW PERMIT

Since last September, miners from all over Oregon (and from outside Oregon) have been working, separately and together (in large and small groups and as individuals) in an attempt to get the "best" permit we could from DEQ ("*best*" meaning a permit that allowed what most of us consider to be normal operations...and yet be protective of the environment where needed).

Along the way, doubts were raised concerning the legal need for a "*National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System*" (NPDES) Permit pursuant to the Clean Water Act. These doubts exist to this day. The new 700-PM General Permit will be an NPDES permit (just like the old 700-J permit). Legal action may be taken, by individual miners, and groups of miners, to test the legality of the NPDES requirement.

(NOTE: Current Oregon law prohibits Application or Processing Fees for permits for suction dredges four inch and smaller. In order for DEQ to charge the proposed \$25.00/yr. fee for all dredges, Oregon law must be amended. Legislation to allow these fees has been proposed by the House, where it has gone through at least one committee... and then apparently stalled. At the time of this writing, we have no idea if the proposed legislation will pass or not... and we may not know until this legislative session comes to a close.

If you are a holder of the Administratively Extended Permit or have an MAO, eventually (maybe as early as 07/01) DEQ will be mailing you an application for the new permit. BEFORE you send them any money (fees), we highly advise you to check with DEQ, Waldo, or other mining organizations to find out if the legislation that allows the fees passed or not. If it didn't pass, and you send them money, you may have a hard time getting your money back!

Letter written to EQC on new permit by Tom Kitchar

Day Marshall: Please forward this message to the members of the EQC. I realize that the comment period for this permit has long since expired, but I feel it is important for the EQC to know some of the facts regarding any support for the 700-PM Permit by members of the Oregon Mining Community.

Dear Environmental Quality Commission;

At your meeting of June 23rd, 2005, one of the items on the agenda was the approval of the new DEQ 700-PM Suction Dredge Mining General Permit.

I apologize for not attending, but I was lead to believe that there would be no opportunity to comment or to submit any testimony, and my presents would have required a 6 hour drive (one way) and loss of a day of work. >From the reports I have seen of the meeting, I now deeply regret not attending.

Several individuals that attended the meeting on the 23rd informed me that **DEQ** (Scott Manzano), while presenting the permit to the Commission, or while answering questions from the Commission, **may have lead the Commission to believe that this permit has the support of some 1,500 Oregon miners.**

NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER

FROM THE TRUTH!

BACKGROUND: In August of 2004, ODEQ informed some individuals in Oregon's mining community that they (DEQ) would be working on a new suction dredge mining permit, and that they expected to have a preliminary draft available in September ('04).

At that time, representatives from many of Oregon's prospecting and mining organizations met, and decided to form a working group comprised of delegated representatives from their individual organizations for the purpose of working together to reach a consensus and help ensure that a fair and equitable permit was obtained.

During the following 3+ months (Sept. thru Dec. '04), the "*Miner's Permit Committee*" (MPC) submitted comments on all four (4) preliminary drafts, and met with DEQ on at least two (2) separate occasions. The MPC submitted comments when the *Final Draft* was released in late December '04. A sub-group of the MPC met at least twice at the state capitol with DEQ and State legislators.

The MPC is comprised of approximately 20 individual delegated representatives from the following ten (10) Oregon mining organizations:

BOHEMIA MINE OWNERS ASSOCIATION (BMOA)
EASTERN OREGON MINING ASSOCIATION (EOMA)
GOLD PROSPECTORS ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA (GPAA)
MILLENNIUM DIGGER'S
MINERAL RESOURCES LEGAL FOUNDATION (MRLF)
NORTH BEND CHAPTER GPAA
NORTHWEST MINERAL PROSPECTORS (NWMP)
SOUTHWEST OREGON MINING ASSOCIATION (SWOMA)
WALDO MINING DISTRICT (WMD)
WILLAMETTE VALLEY MINERS (WVM)

The combined membership of all ten organizations totals over 1,500 individual miners and prospectors. This is the "*1,500 Miners*" referred to by DEQ at the EQC meeting on June 23rd, 2005. (NOTE: In no way does the MPC speak for or represent "*all*" the suction dredge miners of Oregon.)

By unanimous decision by the MPC, Waldo Mining District President, Tom Kitchar, was chosen to act as *Spokesman* for the Committee.

As Spokesman for the MPC, I, Tom Kitchar, do represent and speak for the individual members of the MPC, and through them, the total memberships of the represented organizations.

As Spokesman for the MPC, I want to go on record that the "*1,500 Miners*" referred to by DEQ absolutely have not and DO NOT support, or agree with in any way the new 700-PM permit. In fact, an examination of our comments on the four (4) preliminary drafts and the *Final Draft* will show **we have never supported or agreed to anything proposed by DEQ in relation to the new permit.**

(NOTE: During our meetings with DEQ, we were sometimes offered a choice regarding a certain issue, such as: "*Would we rather have all dredgers pay equally for the permit, or do we want higher fees for non-Oregon residents?*" The fact that we then made a choice (equal fees for everyone) does not in any way suggest we agreed that a fee of any kind was wanted or desired (or agreed to). That DEQ would construe this as "*supporting the permit*" is highly deceptive and totally incorrect.)

From the first preliminary draft, we questioned DEQ's authority, the requirement for a "NPDES" permit, the fees, the fines, the lack of science, along with every single restriction. In most cases, DEQ never responded with anything close to science, law, or a satisfactory answer.

Rather than support the new permit, it is highly likely that the "*1,500 Miners*" will file an appeal or suit to stop this travesty of justice.

(NOTE: It should be noted that the drafting of this permit was forced upon DEQ by threats of a lawsuit by environmental organizations (i.e.; the *Northwest Environmental Defense Center* (NEDC), the *Siskiyou Regional Education Project* (SREP), and others) who's goals are not to protect the environment but rather to prohibit mining (A prohibition on mining would in effect close the "*Public Lands*" (USDA Forest Service and BLM managed lands) to the "*Public*" in that the U.S. Mining Laws are the last laws granting a statutory right (to anyone) to enter the public domain. Remove the land from Mineral Entry and the land is no longer considered "*Public Domain*" but rather

"Federally Administrated Lands"... or in other words, The King's Forest.

By causing a prohibitively restrictive suction dredge mining permit, the environmental organizations hope to destroy Oregon's suction dredge mining industry (which contributes in excess of \$10,000,000 annually to Oregon's economy... removes toxic pollutants such as lead & mercury... and by-the-way also enhances aquatic habitat for years to come) because well over 90% of Oregon's miners mine with suction dredges. Stop suction dredging and you stop most mining in Oregon. Stopping most of the mining makes it much easier (mostly due to abandoned mining claims) to eventually remove the land from Mineral Entry under the Mining Laws. This is the long-term goal of most 'so-called' environmental organizations... the total lock-up of all land where only the privileged few (the environmentalists) are allowed to enter.)

RECOMMENDATION/REQUEST:

I, Tom Kitchar, Spokesman for the Miner's Permit Committee and speaking for approximately 1,500 Oregon Miners, do hereby respectfully request that the Oregon Environmental Quality Commission take action to at least temporarily rescind the approval of the 700-PM General Permit (before the Permit is issued on July 1, 2005) until such a time that an investigative hearing can be scheduled to bring the true facts to light. At a minimum, personnel from DEQ, NEDC, SREP, the mining community, and any other interested parties should be allowed to give testimony and comment to the Commission. Such a hearing should minimally investigate DEQ's authority, the need for a "NPDES" permit, and the science (or lack of) used to base all restrictions on.

On behalf of the Miner's Permit Committee and over 1,500 Oregon Miners, I thank the Commission for the consideration of my comments and request. Please feel free to contact me if I can provide any further information or assistance.

From Scott Manzano to Tom Kitchar

Last Friday, DEQ sent out letters to those that had the expired 700-J, and a new application to those that had the MAO. The 700-J folks need to send us

the letter back with the fee, and the MAO folks need to send us a complete application with the fee. We will then process the letters and the applications, and expect to start sending the permits out in the next day or two.

The permit and rule was officially filed with the Secretary of State's office last Friday, and Lauri Aunan signed the permit this morning. The permit is good until June 30, 2010.
